VICE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

SHELBY PETERSEN

My tenure with the Two Rivers Gallery Board of Directors began a few weeks before the global COVID-19 pandemic was declared. The past three years have been filled with many unexpected hurdles and times of uncertainty. However, throughout these tumultuous times one thing has remained steadfast – the resiliency of Two Rivers Gallery. The amazingly dedicated staff at the Gallery and their ability to adapt as things changed over the years is the number one reason, we're all here together today.

While 2022 did present its own set of challenges, it's the first year that the Gallery was really able to return to in-personal programs and gatherings. However, 2022 also saw the closure of the Shop after a small electrical fire. Luckily, the damage sustained was not as bad as it could have been and even more importantly, no staff and no visitors were harmed. Unfortunately, this fire mean that the Shop was closed for the majority of the year. In the time since the fire, considerable renovations have been completed and things are starting to return to normalcy.

One of the highlights of 2022 is the new Strategic Plan. The Gallery's Strategic Plan is one of the most important documents for the organization. This new Strategic Plan will help to set the foundation and direction for the Gallery over the next five years.

Together, former Executive Director Sara Knelman and the Gallery's Board of Directors worked with the team at Y-Station to make sure the new plan reflected the values and goals of the Gallery. In addition, this new Strategic Plan represents the biggest community consultation the Gallery has undertaken in its history. The overall strategic plan aims to reflect the feedback we heard from staff, from the Board, and from a diverse range of community members and audiences. The consultation process lasted for over four months and I think I can speak for everyone when I say we are really proud of the work that was done. Thank you especially, to former Executive Director Sara Knelmen for all your hard work on this project.

I encourage anyone who hasn't had a chance to look at the Strategic Plan yet to check it out on the Two Rivers website. For those who haven't been able to read it yet, I want to take some time to share the Strategic Foundations with you.

Reconciliation. The work of reconciliation is not just a category of specific action, but ongoing, everyday work to unravel our own harmful historic systems that continue to oppress Indigenous communities. This is our first foundational element, above all others. As the Gallery works through its strategic priorities, it will always be looking for ways to honour a sacred commitment to reconciliation. With continued demonstrated commitment,

the relationship will build over time. Two Rivers has the values, skills and will to make a commitment to setting a standard with their reconciliation efforts.

Fostering Learning Through Contemporary Art, Creativity and Creation.

While the Gallery may exceed the conventional definition of a cultural institution, its impact will always centre on learning through contemporary art, creativity and creation. Supporting creation at every level –from spectator to one-time participant, to emerging amateur, to established artist and everything in between – maintains the momentum required to accomplish the priorities of this plan. The impacts of Two Rivers Gallery will emanate from the Gallery's core of fostering learning from contemporary art, creativity and creation.

Administrative and Financial Health. Every element of the Gallery's strategic ambition requires the application of best practice in administrative support and financial resourcing. Excellence in these areas allow the Gallery to focus its creative and emotional energy on its organizational emergence. The Gallery will focus application of best practice and distribution of resources to serve the foundations and priorities of this strategic plan, particularly its social impact opportunities.

In addition to the Strategic Plan work undertaken by the board, many members were also able to participate in equity, diversity and inclusion and anti-oppression training along with the Gallery staff.

Our board continued to use virtual meetings, when necessary, with many meetings finally happening in person. One of the biggest in-person achievements for 2022 was the Donor Appreciation Night largely organized by Board member, Shelby Richardson. Thank you, Shelby, for helping to host such a fabulous night. In addition, the Gallery was also able to host its first wedding in many years this past July!

Like last year, 2022 was another great year of amazing work under the leadership of former Executive Director, Sara Knelman. Under Sara's leadership the Gallery was able to host many great programs for both children and adults. One of the most exciting aspects of 2022 was the inaugural Community Art Days which I'm sure many in this room were able to attend. As George highlighted in his report, 2022 saw many great exhibitions spanning a variety of diverse topics. Thank you to George and the curatorial team for the amazing work that you do.

A big thank you to staff for their hard work, enthusiasm, and ability to improvise in these ever-changing times. Your constant commitment to the organization, our community, artists, members, and non-members is so admirable. The Gallery is extremely lucky to have such a great staff and we really got to hear what a positive impact the staff has made throughout Prince George during our Strategic Plan consultations. Thank you!

I would like to take a minute to say goodbye to our outgoing Board members and to former Executive Director Sara Knelman.

First, thank you to Kara Biles, our outgoing Board President. Kara has been on the board for an outstanding 9 years. Thank you, Kara, for your commitment and dedication to the board. Your passion has not gone unnoticed, and I think many of my fellow board members will agree that you'll be greatly missed! Kara is not able to attend today but we've sent our thoughts and a gift of appreciation to her.

And, finally, I want to extend a huge thank you to Sara Knelman for all her hard work over the past two or so years. Sara joined the Gallery as Executive Director at the height of the COVID-19 Pandemic and was met with a number of challenges (as was the entire world) throughout her tenure. Sara's leadership and determination help the Gallery make it through and continue to provide programming to the community in many innovative ways. As mentioned earlier, Sara's work on the Strategic Plan has set a strong foundation for the Gallery and has surely paved a way forward for the organization. Thank you, Sara, for everything and I sincerely wish you all the best.

I am grateful to my fellow Directors Kara Biles (President), Ying Hong (Treasurer), Shelby Richardson, Darrin Rigo, Cheryl Schweizer, Audrey McKinnon, Chelsea Dunk, Keli Watson, Jeffrey Wayow, Jennifer Young (Secretary) for your unique perspectives and commitment to the Gallery and to the community of Prince George.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

GEORGE HARRIS

There were many significant moments throughout 2022, a year that began with many COVID restrictions in place and concluded with many of them dissolved. It was a year that saw us return in a substantial way to in-person programs. The resilience and commitment of its staff has been a very important factor in ensuring the ongoing and smooth operation of Two Rivers Gallery and a strong set of programs.

The Politics of Sound curated by Tyler J Stewart, for instance, was an exhibition featuring the work of seven artists. It opened in January and considered how sound is used as a force of oppression and conversely as a means of resistance. The exhibition featured work by jamilah malika abu-bakare, Adam Basanta, Michèle Pearson Clarke, Marjie Crop Eared Wolf, Maskull Lasserre, Benny Nemer and Jessica Thompson, many of whom participated in programs related to the exhibition. jamilah malika abu bakare, you might recall was the guest speaker at last years AGM. Marjie Crop Eared Wolf participated in a panel discussion looking at Indigenous Language revitalization. Michèle Pearson Clarke travelled to Prince George and offered a remarkable presentation in our first in-person talk of the year as we slowly started our re-emergence from the pandemic.

On the occasion of Rita Leistner's exhibition *The Treeplanters*, which opened in April, we were able to organize a great collaboration with Peter Maides and Cinema CNC in order to screen Rita Leistner's documentary film *Forest for the Trees*. Towards the end of the exhibition, treeplanter and tattooist Laurence Morin setup a tattooing station under her portrait featured in the exhibition and invited treeplanters and others to participate in a two day long tattooing performance. Unfortunately, the exhibition was interrupted in its final weeks by a fire that resulted in significant impact to the shop and to the South gallery.

Two Rivers Gallery is a partner in the BC Heritage Emergency Response Network and a highlight of the year was certainly the opportunity to host a two-day work shop that played host to museum professionals across our region and addressed questions and procedures around emergency response to disasters. Five of our staff attended that workshop. One week after it concluded we were given the opportunity to put what we had learned into action when we experienced a small electrical fire. Nobody was harmed and while the damage could have been substantially worse it nevertheless forced the closure of the shop and south gallery for the rest of the year, for restoration and required improvised solutions to our exhibition plan and shop operations.

Remarkably, Community Art Days, an evolved version of Kidz Art DAYZ, was scheduled for the following week. The Galleria, the second floor atrium and just about every other available space was taken up by items from the shop as staff sought to triage and dry the material affected by the fire. It is to the great credit of everyone at Two Rivers Gallery that Community Art Days not only continued unhindered but saw around 7,000 participants over two days

Later in July we opened *Immigration: A Conversation* which related stories around immigration. A smaller version of this exhibition was also developed and circulated to museums in Mackenzie, McBride and Valemount as part of our regional outreach Exhibition Program.

During this exhibition, Learning and Engagement Staff reached out to the Immigrant and Multicultural Services Society and organized a series of special workshops including an illuminating community storytelling evening where new residents of Canada related some of their experiences around immigration. Another highlight was a special evening with HUGS for Ukranians displaced by the war. Learning and engagement staff worked with participants on a creative activity and hosted a dinner. There was much singing of songs and cultural celebration.

gifle امید आशा Hope, our final exhibition of the year in the main galleries featured seven artists from the South Asian Diaspora. It was Curated by Sandeep Johal and her curatorial statement was translated into Arabic, Hindi, Urdu and Punjabi (Gurmukhi) representing the linguistic origins of the seven artists in the exhibition. A catalogue was produced for the exhibition designed by Mustaali Raj one of the exhibition artists and included an essay by Vancouver-based curator Jas Lally.

2022 saw noteworthy exhibitions in the Galleria, an exhibition space that supports regional and emerging artists. These included Mercedes Minck's *Wobbly*, Haley Bassett's *Matrilineal*, and *Lheidli: Where Two Rivers Meet*, a collaborative exhibition between Emily Carr University of Art + Design, the College of New Caledonia, and the Aboriginal Gathering Place. This exhibition told the story of a project in which artists, elders, Indigenous knowledge holders and a physician met virtually and in person to develop a new model for cultural safety education for health care students. This project culminated in a three-day workshop in Prince George in which participants created art objects which were displayed in the Galleria, alongside poetry and photography created during the workshop.

Other notable achievements this year include a switch to a new collections database - Argus - which should improve visitor access to the Permanent Collection. We also purchased important artworks for the collection by Michèle Pearson Clark and jamilah malika abu-bakare. We developed a new strategic plan that stemmed from the largest community consultation in Two Rivers Gallery history. In the fall, we resumed our Creative Space Sundays and reconfigured the Wildside to include a mural by Madeline Kloepper. Regan Shrumm, Accessibility and Community Outreach Advisor, worked with a cohort of seven individuals living with disabilities to complete a physical accessibility

audit of Two Rivers Gallery which will help guide improvements to the space going forward.

Two Rivers Gallery begins and ends with its remarkable staff who are committed to carrying out their work at the gallery with care. Over the year, we have lost some staff and added new faces, but I want to give my sincere thanks to those members of our team over the last year Karen Anderson, Olivia Beck, Crystal Behn, Margaret Browning, Pam Carlson, Derrick Chang, Hannah Cole, Sofia Comas, Teresa Chu, Mia Debbas, Kris Harris, Roxanne Heroux-Boulay, Kait Herlehy, Ev Bowolin, Kaos Campbell, Ming Draper, Melissa Glover, Anna-Maria Lawrie, Alexander McLauchlan, Cassidy Muir, Juri Sudo-Rustad, Samantha Scott, Regan Shrumm and Kyra Thibaudeau. I also want to recognise the great contributions our former Executive Director Sara Knelman. Sara left her role at Two Rivers Gallery at the start of 2023. she is fondly remembered and greatly missed. Finally, I wish to acknowledge the great work of our volunteers for their support, not the least of whom are the members of the Two Rivers Gallery Board of Trustees. The collective work of so many is what makes Two Rivers Gallery the place it is and I am grateful and privileged to be part of this fantastic community of people.
